1. COSI Columbus, the terrific science museum in the state capital, will be open extra hours to accommodate spring-break traffic. The museum, 333 W. Broad St., will be open seven days a week from Wednesday through Sunday, April 19 (excluding Sunday, April 12). The museum is normally closed Mondays and Tuesdays. Admission is \$12.50, \$7.50 for kids 2-12. Information: www.cosi.org or 1-888-819-2674.

2. Take a behind-the-scenes tour of the National Museum of the U.S. Air Force, where you'll see restoration work being done on the Memphis Belle, a B-17F Flying Fortress, among other aircraft. Or stick to the museum's main exhibit space, which showcases more than 400 aerospace vehicles. Behind-the-scenes tours

are scheduled at 12:15 p.m. most Fridays; reservations are required. The museum, located six miles northeast of Dayton on the Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, is open 9 a.m.-5 p.m. daily; admission is free. Information: 937-255-3286 or www.nationalmuseum.af.mil.

3. If you have a dinosaur devotee in your family, head to the Carnegie Museum of Natural History in Pittsburgh, where the

new permanent exhibit "Dinosaurs in Their Time," showcases one of the world's best dinosaur collections. Among the new attractions: Two T. rexes facing off in a confrontation over an Edmontosaurus. Admission is \$15, \$11 for kids 3-18, and includes entrance to the Carnegie Museum of Art next door. The museum, at 4400 Forbes Ave., is open Tuesday through Sunday. Hours vary. Information:
